

Fox

The cubs start to take solid food three to four weeks after their birth.

This is often partially digested food regurgitated by their mother.

Adder

Males shed their dull winter skin and prepare for the mating season.

Robin

The female loses her underfeathers so she can warm her eggs, which she lays a day apart. She may lay up to six eggs while the male continues to provide her with food. The eggs hatch after fourteen days, one per day, as they were laid.

Swallow, Housemartin and Willow warbler

These travellers return from their winter migrations in Africa.

Tawny owl

The eggs are laid in the nesting chamber. The female will stay inside and brood them for a month while her mate feeds her.

Badger

Adults start to emerge before nightfall as the days lengthen.

Hedgehog

The solitary creatures briefly pair up at some point between April and August, and after mating go their separate ways again.

Roe Deer

Females give birth to one or two fawns in the second half of the month.
